


## Human Rights Day Letter

**UDHR**: Universal Declaration of Human Rights. A document signed by 192 countries, including the UK, saying they will protect human rights.


ECHR: European Convention of Human Rights. A law agreed by 46 countries, including the UK, saying what rights we have and that we can take the government to court if they do not look after them.
